## **WELCOME**



#### **Ben Roberts: Lay of the Land**

## Virtual Connections: How Distribution, Festivals and Venues became Long Distance Friends

When UK cinemas closed in March the industry was thrown into an existential crisis: how could we continue to connect films and audiences, without venues?



**Anna Germanidi** of Modern Films discusses their pioneering Virtual Cinema model, and **Nia Edwards-Behi** from Abertoir Horror Festival reflects on the pivot to a digital edition of the festival. The session will be chaired by **Claire Vaughan**, Cinema Programme Manager, Chapter Cardiff.







### **DAY ONE**

#### **SESSION 2 12.30-13.30**

#### Cinema: The Local and the Future

This year we've seen plenty of column inches and airtime dedicated to the 'return of local', the 'death of the shopping centre' and 'building back better'. What do these terms mean, and how can we relate them to cinema's role in the future of our towns and cities? Can cinema be a catalyst for development, beyond the multiplex model?

We'll hear from Head of Cinema at the Barbican Centre, **Gali Gold**, and Producer **Wilna Fourie**, who works on cultural projects across East London, and Newcastle Community Cinema who have created a thriving venue at the foot of the Mourne Mountains in Northern Ireland. A chance to look at new models of what cinema can be through community, development and partnership.

#### **SESSION 3 14.15-15.15**

#### **Diversifying British Film Culture**

This panel aims to discuss and examine Black-led films that are produced and released theatrically in the UK and the barriers that prevent them from achieving box office success.

Chaired by Gower Street Box Office Analyst **Delphine Lievens**, the panel is made up of representatives from production, distribution and exhibition; **Shanida Scotland**, (Head of Film, The Doc Society) and **Grace Barber-Plentie** (Marketing Coordinator, BFI). How can our sectors collaborate to actively promote better representation within the workforce, and UK film culture more widely?

#### **SESSION 4 15.30-16.30**

## Vital Statistics: Understanding the Economic and Cultural Impact of the Cinema Sector

In a year dominated by data, the film industry has continued to depend on numbers; quantifying the impact of the pandemic, what it means for the industry and what we need to do to ensure a sustainable future.

**Ian Cade** and **Julia Lamaison** from the BFI's Research and Statistics team will share the vital statistics they have been gathering and analysing, and what this means for the rescue, recovery and future resilience of the sector.

#### **SESSION 5 16.45-17.30**

#### The Radical in the Practical: The How? of Young Audience Development

Representatives from the **FAN Young Consultants** advocate for the value that 16-30 year olds bring to venues, outlining practical ways to attract and keep young audiences.

Speakers **Caroline Wilson**, **Megan Mitchell**, **Thea Berry**, **Gabrielle Jackson** call for cinemas to act now and to ensure activity and communications are relevant in light of COVID-19. With thanks to contributors Rebekah Taylor, Aaron Guthrie, Yasmin Begum and Phil Kennedy.

#### **Back to Business?**

In the wake of the seismic changes to the film industry wrought by COVID-19, this panel will take a look at the ecosystem of the industry during the pandemic, and ahead to recovery. Representatives from production, distribution and exhibition will discuss what they've learned this year, what plans are in place, and crucially what's next for the industry as they see it.

#### **SESSION 7 12.30-13.30**

#### An Injury to One, is an Injury to All: Working Together for Better Workplaces

Cinema is a collective art form, from creator to consumer. The same collective impulse that delivers great films to audiences can help individual workers increase their power and stand together to demand the changes we wish to see across the whole industry.

Representatives from BECTU and the Film and TV Charity will lead this panel, chaired by **Hugh Odling-Smee** (Film Hub NI) on the issues facing exhibition workers across the UK, outline the support available, and propose steps to improve conditions across the sector.

### **DAY TWO**

#### **SESSION 8 14.15-15.15**

#### **Welcoming All Audiences Back**

Launched by We Shall Not Be Removed in September, the *Seven Principles for an Inclusive Recovery* offer practical guidance to arts and cultural organisations to support disabled artists, audiences, visitors, participants and employees.

**Lizzie Banks** (Oska Bright Film Festival) will chair this session with **Andrew Miller** (We Shall Not Be Removed), **Eleana Re** (Carousel) and others exploring how deaf, disabled and neurodiverse audiences feel about returning to cinemas and how venues can make venues safe and accessible for all.

#### **SESSION 9 15.30-16.30**

#### **Governance 101**

A session covering the structures and components of a cultural organisation led by **Catriona Reynolds**, Head of Governance and Engagement at Arts and Business Scotland. Learn about the functions and responsibilities of boards and why legality and accountability are so important within our sector. How can board members and venue staff work collaboratively and have open, mutually beneficial dialogues?


#### **SESSION 10 16.45-17.30**


#### **SESSION 11 10.55-11.55**

#### What is Cinema?

The COVID-19 crisis has impacted every part of our lives; asking to consider how we do things, whilst also raising the more profound question: why? Cinema is no stranger to an existential quandary - from TV to streaming services, the challenges resurface each decade.

Our current dilemma, with venues closed and films being released at home, prompts serious reflection on the role and value of the cinema. Can cinema survive and be reimagined beyond a commercial imperative? What is its future cultural role? What might its relationship with local audiences and communities be?

We are delighted to welcome two of the UK's most influential film culture practitioners; award-winning filmmaker and artist **John Akomfrah CBE** and BFI Creative Director **Heather Stewart**, to share their experiences, expertise and to discuss the future of cinema. Moderated by **Mark Cosgrove**, Cinema Curator at Watershed Bristol.



## **DAY THREE**

#### **SESSION 12 12.30-13.30**

#### **Reframing Recruitment**

A focus on diversity and inclusion in recruitment is not new, but the urgency surrounding the inequalities at play across society have been further exposed as a result of COVID-19 and the Black Lives Matter movement.

What can we learn from organisations like Young Vic and Unlimited, who have approached recruitment in new ways? What other factors might help remove barriers for people from all walks of life to work and flourish in our sector? The panel, chaired by **Reba Martin**, includes **Mikaela Smith** (Programme Manager, Showroom Cinema), **Sue Emmas** (Associate Artistic Director, Young Vic) and **Jo Verrent** (Senior Producer, Unlimited).

#### **SESSION 13 14.15-15.15**

#### **Dismantling Structural Inequalities in Your Cinema**

In response to the *Diversifying British Film Culture* session join us for this conversation about the practicalities of systemic change. **Sadia Pineda Hameed** will discuss her work *Dismantling Structural Inequalities in Your Cinema*. CCA Glasgow's **Alex Misick** will speak about their approaches to partnering with ethnically diverse organisations including Dardishi Film Festival. This session will be chaired by **Tara Brown**, Co-Director of Wotever DIY Film Festival, Fringe! Queer film & arts festival programmer and most recently Film Programmer for Bernie Grant Art Centre.


#### Freelancing in 2020: The State of Play

## Film Screening: Stray Available from 19.00 2nd December for 24 hours

Our sponsors INDY Cinema host an early preview screening of documentary *Stray* by award-winning filmmaker **Elizabeth Lo**, with thanks to Dogwoof. Captioned by Matchbox Cineclub.

Through the eyes of stray dogs wandering the streets of Istanbul, *Stray* explores what it means to live as a being without status or security. As they search for food and shelter, three dogs embark on inconspicuous journeys through Turkish society that allow us an unvarnished portrait of human life. Through their canine eyes, we are shown a human world ruptured by divisions along class, ethnic, and gender lines.
